

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Dear Friends

We are now in Lent and this time last year we went into our very first lockdown, we shared our last hug, maybe that pint with a friend, popping into Church to do a few jobs, picked up kids from an afterschool Club. How the last twelve months has changed.

However away from Covid, frustrations of 2020 and the start of 2021. Something has not changed, God. Lent did not change last year and will not change this year. We might not be able to gather as much as we would traditionally have but Lent is not a season to give up chocolate and tell everyone about it, Lent is a season to draw in and close to God.

We come to God at the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday in repentance, asking for forgiveness, to begin Lent in a place of peace and seeking him.

So how is Lent? Are you drawing in? What have you taken up? One of my joys of the last 12 months has been the opportunity to join together as Church Wigan in worship. Through those who have been able to connect to Church Wigan Facebook page for Morning and Evening prayers but many praying together by following with the paper copy or on the Church Wigan website, to the daily reflections from Church Wigan. If you don't know about these, check out the Church Wigan website or sign up for the daily emails. What has been so good is as one Church we have prayed and worshiped together.

There has been so much hurt and pain in the last 12 months, I have just been watching an interview from Whiston Hospital on ITV, sharing about the trauma that all staff are facing daily of tiredness and seeing so many coming on the ward and losing their lives. Covid has meant each one of us has been affected, many of us have lost loved ones, many of us have felt lost and hopeless. Being lost is hard and when your lost you want to be found.

Lets take ourselves back to that invitation in Lent, we are not invited to a church building, we are not invited, to that group, we are not invited to that course or even invited to go for that drink. We are invited to come to God, to spend time with Him, to listen to Him, to seek Him. Our challenge this Lent is to really take up this challenge to spend time with God. As we look towards Spring and the Summer, where in hope we shall begin to meet more, groups will start again and many new things will be created in response to how things have changed, for example what are we offering those who have been bereaved in last 12 months, how are we connecting with our young people? How we meet with people who have not left their house for 12 months. The huge financial implications of the last 12 months where many are struggling to feed families, in debt fearful of each month.


To be ready for meeting, sharing hope and the promise of God, we need begin in a place of prayer, meeting God. With this in mind we shall be finishing our small groups on 17th March and then the 24th March and 7th April we shall gather in prayer via Zoom. Also we are gathering 10am each Sunday on Zoom to pray, and hope to introduce a time of prayer before our services when we meet in buildings.

When we come to a place of listening, waiting and prayer God will ignite and speak to us. So this Lent I invite you to use this season to listen and wait and I finish with these words from James. A great book to read and pray through in Lent.

James 5: 5-7

Be patient, then, my friends, until the Lord comes. See how patient farmers are as they wait for their land to produce precious crops. They wait patiently for the autumn and spring rains. ⁸ You also must be patient. Keep your hopes high, for the day of the Lord's coming is near.

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Sin

Of all the concepts in the Christian religion, none has been more decisively rejected in modern society than that of sin. The widely acclaimed TV series set in the context of the 1980 Aids epidemic has as its title, *It's a Sin*. This choice of title makes it clear that many people now take it for granted that "sin" is not only an outdated category, but that the very concept is harmful and oppressive.

A word translated as "sin" in English translations of New Testament is the Greek word, αμαρτία (*hamartia*). The basic meaning of this word is "missing the mark" (as in an archery competition) or taking the wrong path and getting lost.

The Bible insists that God made the world, and that he made it good. Yet, when we look around us, we see both good and bad. There is a great deal that is good about the world, there is a great deal of love and kindness, of joy and achievement. But there is also much that is wrong. There is massive inequality and violence. Millions of human beings lack the necessities of life, or live a life without basic freedoms. Good things, like human sexual relationships, are twisted into forms which are oppressive and abusive. Can it be doubted that, in so many ways, human beings have missed the mark, have taken a wrong path and have become lost?

What is to be done about this? Laws can certainly help. In a developed society, with reasonably honest institutions and a system of law, there is no doubt that most people live a better, more secure life than they would in conditions of anarchy, where the weak have no protection from the strong.

The people of Israel were particularly proud of their Law. Not only did they believe that it had been given to them by God, through Moses, but they thought it was obviously better than any other system around at the time, and much better than the chaos outside organised society. Look at Psalm 19. The first six verses tell of the perfection of the heavens, the mathematical precision of the movements of the heavenly bodies mirroring God's own perfection. Then, without missing a beat, from verse 7, the perfection of God's Law is celebrated in the same way.

Yet, in verse 12, the psalmist pleads, "But who can detect their errors? Clear me from hidden faults." Even if God's Law is perfect, how can we keep it?

Inherent in the concept of sin, of missing the mark, of getting lost, is the possibility of change. It is possible, having missed the mark, to hit it next time. It is possible, having got lost, to find the right way again. If there is sin, then there might also be repentance.

Having given up on the idea of sin, it was perhaps inevitable that society would, in time, also give up the idea of the possibility of repentance and forgiveness. We see that in our growing prison populations, in our overcrowded, drug-riddled prisons and impossibly overworked prison staff. If bad people are just bad, then all we can do is lock them away for as long as possible.

If we are losing the battle on "sin", then matters are just as bad with "forgiveness". People are exasperated when Christians talk about forgiving. If the mother of a murdered son is known to be a Christian, reporters will thrust a microphone in her face and ask, "Do you forgive his murderer?" They understand Christians to teach cheap forgiveness, cheap grace.

But go into a Christian church and you will encounter a Man hanging on a cross - depicted above a Catholic altar or preached from a Protestant pulpit. We can't fully understand why Jesus had to die to bring us forgiveness, but we do know that God takes sin seriously. The harm done by wrongdoing cannot easily be dismissed. The people who are hurt by wrongdoing matter. To heal the wounds caused by sin, God, in the person of his Son, himself came to be wounded and tortured. "Hands that flung stars into space, to cruel nails surrendered."

God's solution to the problem of sin was not merely to condemn it. It was to come himself in Jesus, to take on all the chaos and wrong of the world, and to give himself for our redemption, as someone redeems an item from a pawnbroker, to pay the price to set us free. Forgiveness is both free and infinitely costly.

We cannot avoid missing the mark in our own strength. We cannot always know the right path to take. But God has not only offered us forgiveness, he has promised the help of his Holy Spirit to guide us. This is Good News that is still, and always will be, relevant. The alternative is resignation and despair.

The Friendship Group – St. Matthew's

The 'lockdown' and 'social distancing' has been very trying for almost all of us over the past many months. Not something that you need to be told of course. One specific group of people who have been particularly hit by these circumstances is the elderly. Often living alone, they are the age group particularly susceptible to corona virus and have been repeatedly told to self-isolate to shield themselves from risk. Being alone they can therefore go for very long periods without social contact of any kind and if their church is also closed, which can be their sole means of contact with others, they can feel that the world is against them. If you consider that a lot of these people can have few contacts at the best of times, it can often bring feelings of intense loneliness.

This is why the Friendship Group was formed, to try to give a little companionship to people who otherwise may struggle to find it.

It was the original idea of Mary Pratt who lost husband Sam a short time before I lost my wife Margaret. She approached me with the idea of forming a group to cater for people who have been bereaved. It struck me as a very good idea and so we began. From an initial membership of six we gradually increased to our present level where he have had as many as 22 members and regularly see 18+ attendees at our weekly meetings on Wednesday afternoons in the Parish Hall. We have tea, coffee, home-made cake and even the odd bottle of wine (or two) and buffets to celebrate birthdays. We also visit local hostelries for meals and St. John's Pantomime at Christmas,

with a regular highlight being lunch at Ashton Golf Club arranged by Brian. I have been fortunate enough to attract sponsorship from the National Lottery and also our local councilors to pay for transport to places of interest further afield. Due to current circumstances we have been unable to arrange anything this year after our initial trip for lunch and a boat trip on Windermere had to be cancelled back in April. However, the cash is still there. We ask for a nominal membership fee of one pound per week currently, which invariably has been donated to our church for letting us use the Parish Hall. We have also paid for items, e.g. the church Christmas Tree for the past couple of years as a way of thanks.



This brings me to the reason for this article. For a long time I have

felt that bereavement as the only qualification for membership is rather unfair and precludes many from joining. I feel that simple loneliness is also an eminent qualification. I have therefore personally contacted all of our members to ask their opinions and been gratified to receive overwhelming support to open membership to others.

It has to be stated however, that our original aim of catering for bereaved people is still at the forefront of our thoughts and we are not looking for married couples to apply for membership. I also considered that a change of name could perhaps be appropriate and the acronym 'CAMEO' was suggested. This stands for 'come and meet each other' and could be considered apt in the circumstances. However, this is something which can be debated at our first meeting and I have no strong feeling either way.

So, if you are not already a member and feel that you qualify and would like to join us please come along. People from our fellow Hub churches are very welcome, though we have always said that we are interdenominational and have currently members of R.C., Methodist and Salvationist churches in our midst. Because we are unable at time of writing to give any date for the recommencement of our meetings perhaps you may wish to ring me first, either for yourself, or for others that you feel could benefit. I will keep you updated on what is planned. In fact, by the time you read this we should all have received vaccination against the 'lurgy' and will hopefully be getting ready for the rest of our lives.

LIGHTHOUSE ONLINE



At the start of Lent 2020 *Lighthouse* were gathering after school on a Tuesday, prayer walking around Worsley Mesnes each day, getting together to pray and sing once a week, and being together to have fun and eat each week.

Lighthouse stopped gathering when lockdown started, and due to the amount of online things happening across Church Wigan and West Hub we decided not to do our own. We were really pleased to see that

BEING LIGHT TOGETHER our Lighthouse people were supporting each other - Lighthouse wasn't just a meeting people came to, it had grown into a community with Jesus at its centre.

We didn't stop being a worship community though, our meetings or lack thereof didn't define us. Throughout 2020 *Lighthouse* supported both each other and the wider

community with phone calls, prayer, food hampers, shopping, and anything else we were able to do. We also delivered education packs and food packs on behalf of St James School.

At the start of 2021 the *Lighthouse* leadership team discerned that it was time to launch *Lighthouse* online. We prayed and planned via Zoom, asking the question of how we replicate our in-building gathering which was based around sitting down together, chatting, and sharing a meal.

Each week we prepare and deliver a pack for each household which contains

- Snacks for eating during our meeting.
- Printouts of the activities and the Bible passage we're looking at, so that people who aren't able to engage fully online have everything written down and don't have to hear everything we say.
- Crafts, for younger and older children.
- Response activity, so that people have the opportunity to respond to what has been said with an action.
- A straightforward meal for after, so that people aren't having to worry about preparing a meal after doing Lighthouse.

We have around 30 families who are part of Lighthouse with a total of nearly 100 people who join in. Our gatherings, held via Zoom



each Tuesday and streamed to our Facebook group, give people the opportunity to hear and respond to the gospel and to be part of a community which eats together, learns together, and prays together.

You can find *Lighthouse* on Facebook (search for *lighthouseWigan*). We have a private Facebook group where we share the Zoom details and host the livestream, please message us if you'd like to join in.

As a Christian one of the biggest and greatest joys we have is to give. To give our finances, our time, and our lives to God. A relationship with Jesus is about sacrifice. He sacrificed his life for you. To follow him will bring persecution, hurt, pain and sacrifice. It will also bring you joy, laughter, fellowship, hope and promise of what is to come.

I don't know about you, but I love God, I love his plans, I love what he is doing in our new Parish and have been overwhelmed with stories of God at work in our community in this last year even through the challenges of 2020 and living through Covid19. Throughout my Christian life one of the biggest joys is to give. Each year me and Toni pray together as we begin the year to pray these prayers:

What are you asking us to do this year?

What do you want us to give to not only our tithe to God, but what charities, people and needs?

Why do we pray this prayer? Because this is what we are called to do.

We are not asked to give to a building but are asked to give to God.

There has been concern about joining as a new Parish about where are money is going, new

worship communities beginning how do they begin to give.

It is not a complicated answer we give to the Parish of West Wigan. Where does this go? Across every worship community, but if I am

honest, I do not really want to think about where or who it comes from. The focus and challenge I would like to offer you is we are not giving to that worship community or building or even Parish. We are giving to God.

In Leviticus is says this:

³⁰ One tenth of all the produce of the land, whether grain or fruit, belongs to the LORD.

This is where the idea that we give 10% of our income to God, however over the years there been challenge on this, for example when living in

London I remember being in a small group and this guy said if that was the case I would hardly give as his wage was so high and giving only 10% would not hurt his bank account, then another person in the same group said she would not have enough to pay the rent or eat if she did that.

The biblical call to give is we give to God, not the building, not history but to God. We give what we can, God loves a cheerful giver are you full of joy when you give?

One of my favourite passages in the bible is the Widows Mite in Mark 12: 41-44. Here we see this widow give only a few coins, but this coin comes from a place of sacrifice.

When we give it comes from a place of sacrifice. That is the biblical teaching and call as a Christian we don't give because it is nice to do but it comes

from a place of giving God the glory, it is a sacrifice and such a joy to. I could share story after story about how joyful it is to give both personally, within Church giving and in leading a Christian charity.

In 2021 what does this mean to you?

Some hard facts for us all to hear and understand like so many other areas within the nation the Church is struggling financially. This is not because we have overspent on our buildings, we have not got fancy kit, as a PCC our headline is simple we just don't have enough coming in on the plate/ online. We have gone nearly 12 months of not

receiving gifts on the plate but even before Covid we were struggling.

2021 we shall be asking you to prayerfully consider your giving, monthly or as a one-off gift. One of our members of our PCC

prophetically said these words.

"Imagine if we had 300 people give £1000 in 2021 we would have £300,000"

This would pay for our running costs, Parish share or now known as Deanery share which enables ministry

and services to happen and grow new leaders and new congregations, maintenance of buildings our and most importantly enable us to plant, grow and



develop new ministries and new leaders. As our Bishops have challenged to us to see: A Bigger Church, making a bigger difference, more people knowing Jesus and more Justice in the world. To enable us to do this we need to looking to the kingdom not the bank balance.

Jeff our fantastic treasurer has outlined all the ways we can give and Jeff has a fantastic team of Assistant treasurers:

Gordon James at St James

Angela Matthewson and John Ashurst at St Matthews

Andrew Trow and Karen Vickerman at St Pauls.

We want to thank them for stepping into these new roles and Jeff leading the team.

Finally to make the giving point clear giving to the Parish of West Wigan. Jeff outlines if you were to set up Parish Giving Scheme it goes to Parish of West Wigan now. This means the money goes across ALL worship communities. You still are giving to your congregations but as I have explored in the article all our money goes to God not a

building or congregation and I encourage you to celebrate this, be joyful in your giving and ask God in prayer what He maybe asking you to give. My hope and dream is that in 2022 we wont be thinking about finances that we can be a Parish that is

looking at who we are giving too. For us to be able to do this we need to be people looking towards God and how we give to him, Jeff is going to outline this but I leave you with these words from James.

Every good gift and every perfect present comes from heaven; it comes down from God, the Creator of the heavenly lights, who does not change or cause darkness by turning (James 1:17)

The ways to give?

First of all, a big thank you to all those who have continued supporting the work of the church over the last very difficult 12 months be it by giving time or money without you we could not have carried on. There are several ways you can continue

supporting your church in these financially challenging times.

By far the preferred method is by joining the Parish Giving Scheme and a big thank you to all those who have already signed up. If you have not already joined the scheme please seriously consider doing so, it only takes a 10 minute phone call.

Why give by this method?

Your gift is *always* in your full control (by email or phone) with PGS. The Scheme is for every church member with a bank account. You do not need to pay tax.

Your gift leaves your account by Direct Debit on the 1st of each month. It is in Wigan West account by the 11th and any Gift Aid reclaims by the end of the month. The PGS saves time and administration and helps with cash flow. Even though we can't worship in church your gift will support our ministry and PGS helps us make generous giving part of our daily life and discipleship.

How do I do this?

You can give to Wigan West Parish by making a ten-minute phone call:

- 1. Have your bank details to hand: account number, sort code and the name of your bank.
- 2. Have the church details to hand: our church name **Wigan West Parish** and our unique PGS church code: **220220288**
- 3. Ring the PGS office in Gloucester on **0333 002 1271**. They will guide you through the process.
- 4. If you are a taxpayer and wish to Gift Aid you can arrange this during your phone call. Any existing Gift Aid declaration to Wigan West Parish is unaffected.

You have the option to increase your giving by inflation each year. Many do this. If you do choose this, PGS will check with you every year to make sure you still want to increase your Direct Debit.

You will receive confirmation by email or post of your Direct Debit, the amount and date of your first PGS gift. If you already give by standing order, remember to cancel it once PGS have confirmed with you.

If you already give regularly by Standing Order you will need to cancel your existing one, as the current existing church bank accounts will be closed later in the year and either join the PGS or raise a new standing order in favour of **Wigan West PCC Sort Code 30-90-89 Account Number 58811360** this is the new **Lloyds Bank** account.

Those of you who prefer to stay with the envelope scheme can just carry on giving by that method, it will stay in existence for however long it is needed.

Anyone wishing to make donations by cheque should make them payable to Wigan West PCC or alternatively by BACS transfer to the Wigan West PCC account above.

ST. MATTHEW'S CRICKET CLUB

As we look forward to further works on our beautiful ground following our fabulous Crowdfunding appeal that raised £25,500, thank you all so much; it's worth reminding ourselves of how important the ground and facilities have been to the local community over many years.

These are a selection of photos taken between 1934 and 1955.

Before 1956, the Parish Hall, Bars, Lounge and current Cricket Pavilion didn't exist. Instead, there was just the original building built in 1924, which now comprises the hall entrance, main hall kitchen and ladies and gents toilets. In



front of what are now the hall kitchen windows, was a veranda with a striking wooden structure and glass canopy. This building was the original cricket pavilion.



These pictures show:

A gathering of ladies and children in 1934 for what is referred to as a "Field Treat". They are stood outside of the original cricket pavilion as outlined above.

A rare picture of the old refreshment hut which was positioned on the side elevation of the original building, so before the Parish Hall was built. The structure of the original cricket pavilion is clearly visible.

The gentleman in the foreground looks very much like Jimmy Hesketh, a long standing cricket club Secretary and one of Highfield CC's very first Honorary Life Members.



As I sat to reflect on what appeared to be a missed opportunity, I received a phone call from a former pupil of Highfield St Matthew's School and a member of our church

community, offering to pay for a for school laptop use. With the support of the school IT provider, an appropriate specification was ordered identified, and paid for by the anonymous benefactor.
