Dear friends,

I write this in Holy week (the strangeness of deadline dates is always the 15th). This afternoon I joined with the St James home Communion team to share communion with three members of our community. This was a real Holy moment as one member who had not received communion for over two years said these words: "I feel so much better now, just meeting God through this."

Holy week is Holy but sometimes Holy week can be a busy week.

The next day I did something different, I played 5-aside against a team from the hotel in Wigan who have arrived from Afghanistan. I play 5-a-side each



Wednesday with some clergy and staff from St Paul's School and a few others, this is great for my wellbeing and great to be outside. This 5-a-side match is a weekly outing for those from the hotel as they are unable to work and can't do much, this has been a great joy for them as they wait to be rehoused. They have even had some training from Wigan Athletic. So when we were invited to play them we jumped at the chance. Seeing two communities of football joining as one, I call this a Holy moment.

At the start of June and throughout this year there are celebrations to celebrate the Queen, the Queen has been a Holy leader. Each year at the Queen's speech I say to Toni that she becomes more of a preacher and evangelist each year. Sometimes we forget how passionate about Jesus Queen Elizabeth is. She continually creates holy moments for us as she leads us.

By the time you have read this I should have been on retreat, I am so excited! It's not the thought of having 12 hours of sleep and eating a meal in silence, I am excited to read, walk, and listen to God. It's one of the things I have missed, as I have not been on retreat since 2019. Why are retreats so important? Because this gives space to listen, wait, and come to the holy moments with God. Retreats should not just be for those who minister, Toni went on retreat in 2019 after me and we both said this needs to be a tradition we start. Covid then started, so 2022 is the year to start this again. The reason is to stop, listen, and wait and come to those holy moments with God.

The things Jesus did the most in his ministry were not speaking, healing, or teaching, He went off on his own to listen and find a holy moment with God. The last thing Jesus did with his disciples was to pray and wait and listen.

As we come towards the summer months and a spring and summer with hopes of less Covid restrictions I invite each one of you to think about what that lady we visited with home communion said. "I needed that."

What do you need in your life to have that holy moment? Maybe it's to retreat? Maybe it is to be part of that small group, maybe it's to serve in that worshipping community. Maybe it's to play in that five-a-side team. What is clear in the Bible is that we need to create space in our busy lives to stop and be with God.

How and what does that look like for you?

In 1 Samuel in Samuel's farewell speech, he said this: 1 Samuel 12: 16 *Now then, stand still and see this great thing the Lord is about to do before your eyes!* As we move forward in the coming months, and do more as a Parish, I invite each one of us to take time to be still and find that holy moment as we seek God together.

St Pauls Church Building

In our warden's letter last month we shared that we are starting to work with an architect to reorder St Pauls Church building. In 2019 we had plans rejected for reordering St Pauls and this was a real disappointment. However, we then moved into a two-year lockdown so maybe God was preparing us for this season.

As we have prayed about starting this process again a number of opportunities have arisen. Us being a bigger Parish has helped us think about the needs of our community, for example, St Matthews Hall and St Pauls Hall are generally booked up most evenings of the week and there are fewer community spaces to use in the area so there is a real need for community spaces.

The vision has always been to take the pews out of the Church to enable us to have a very different worship space and this would give us three very different worship spaces across the Parish and also a building that could be used by the wider community seven days a week. Also, the Faith Cafe team are excited to plant a cafe in a reordered St Pauls and there are other opportunities like this.

We do not know the time scale but we have just started working with our architect Maggie Mullen and can use some of the background work that went on in 2019. We have a building team: Mark Wade and Cliff Unsworth are project leads and are joined by Ann Birch and Martin Gaskell our Church Wardens, Emma Farley and Pam Wilkinson who represent our PCC and Fran Humphry as Curate. Please do pray as we begin to plan, design and get permission and create a space that enables us to grow disciples and bless our local community. Please do speak to any of the team if you have questions.

The Guiders

The Lord's Prayer Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

Where the King James Bible has Jesus telling Pontius Pilate, "My kingdom is not of this world" (John 18:36), modern translations usually have, "My kingdom is not from this world." The newer translations give a better idea of the original meaning for today's English speakers. Jesus is not telling Pontius Pilate that his kingdom has nothing to do with this world. If that were the case, why would he have instructed us to pray for God's kingdom to come on earth? Jesus is saying that his authority does not originate in this world – it comes from his Father.

God's kingdom, and therefore Jesus's kingdom, is not a place, but his rule: it is his kingship. God's kingdom exists where Jesus's commands are obeyed. The battle against evil was won decisively by Jesus on the cross but his kingship, his rule, is yet to come in its fullness. If you want to know what God's kingdom is like, then there are many, many pictures in the gospels. If you want a manifesto for God's kingdom, you can't do better that to look up Luke, Chapter 1, verses 46-55, the passage we know as the Magnificat. The values of this world are turned on their head: the mighty are brought low and the humble and meek raised up, the hungry fed and the rich sent away empty.

If the Church is to be true to its vocation, then it must be a foretaste of God's kingdom, a community where God's values rather than the world's are lived out. It has to be admitted that in some matters, the world has been ahead of the Church in its acceptance of difference, but our society has some big blind spots when it comes to inclusion. The biggest one of all is wealth. The Savoy Hotel in London would rightly be in trouble if it discriminated against potential guests on grounds of their ethnicity, or gender, or sexuality, or disability. But it has no trouble at all discriminating against those who can't afford $\pounds4000$ a night for one of their best rooms.

People who approach the Church to have their child baptized are often surprised at the answer to the question, "How much does a baptism cost?" The answer, of course, is nothing. God's grace is free and without charge. Once we have accepted the free gift of God's grace in Jesus, then we have a responsibility to give of what we have to support the Church's mission. But if we have nothing, or next to nothing, then God through his Church will give us the same Holy Baptism, the same Holy Communion, the same saving message and the same hope of eternal life that would be given to a billionaire who donates enormous sums to our finances. There may be many dwelling places in God's house, but I'm pretty confident that, unlike at the Savoy, there is no optional extra price tariff for a dwelling place with a river view!

In order to meet people where they are, we sometimes organize special groups and even special worshipping communities for particular groups of people, perhaps those who work in a particular sector, or those with particular cultural traditions. But if these ever become exclusive groups which separate Christians according to the world's categories, in the way that the Dutch Reformed Church did in apartheid South Africa, then they cease to be signs of God's kingdom. When we come forward to receive Holy Communion, we stand or kneel beside those who are very different from ourselves, people who look, sound and perhaps even smell very different from us. That rarely happens outside the Church. The old and the young, the fit and the weary, Black and White, rich and poor, we all come as equals before the might and the mercy of God.

The Christian hope is that, ultimately, God's love and peace will triumph over the sin and hate of this world, and all will be in accordance with his perfect will. In the meantime, in this age of grace, we are called upon to be ambassadors of this now and future kingdom. Jesus was born into a messy, violent world, with competing visions of how society should be ordered, and difficult judgements to be made about allegiance and loyalty. Our faith teaches us that he lived a life, much of it an ordinary life in an ordinary job, in such a context, without sin. We too have to decide on priorities – our duties to ourselves, our families, our church, those in need. Nobody promised us that this would be easy. But we pray for the wisdom of God's Holy Spirit to guide us, and we hold before us the values of God's kingship, of the infinite worth of every human being made in God's image, even those whom the world thinks are worth nothing.


Starting Rite is 5 sessions designed specifically for babies and toddlers and their parents. Each session is laid out in Jenny Paddison's book 'Starting Rite'. When Jenny, an Anglican priest, became a mum she realised there were 1001 different baby groups but nothing for their spiritual nurture. The sessions involve a lot of singing, stories, and a welcoming environment.

For some, is God a difficult subject to talk about, it's also difficult to know how to introduce our invisible God to our babies. We know our Christening families bring their children to church to bring them close to God, and this is a way we can help them to find songs, games, and terminology to further their whole families intimacy with God. For example, we play peekaboo and talk about how just because we can't see God, he is there, and we can sometime sense his presence. We read a book called 'peekaboo' and lift flaps to see faces behind hair and hats and doors to think about how we too must lift the flaps in life to actively seek Gods face. We read the book 'How much love?' with big hare and baby hare and realise no matter how much we love; God is bigger and will always love us more. We think about the best things about being a parent and how our children feel about us to deepen the father/child relationship of God as *our* father. All the things we love about being a parent is what God loves about being our daddy. We flicker fairy lights and consider the light and dark in the world, free will and choices. We get the bubble machine out and fill the room with bubbles to explain how God wants us to send little prayer bubbles to him all day long and not just one at the end of the day. We learn how easy it is to pray and how God is interested in every tiny prayer bubble. We tell stories of the lost sheep, the wise man and the foolish man, Moses setting Gods people free and God leading Moses through the wilderness to get to the real meanings behind bible stories... Jesus never gives up on us, he is a solid, unmoveable foundation, God guides and makes a way for us.

Feedback from the families has been that they enjoy; 'the welcoming and friendly environment, singing and learning about God in a fun and child friendly way', 'Singing and meeting other parents and babies', 'Learning and watching the children play'.

Some of the parents have done the session multiple times and want to keep meeting in between Starting Rite sessions. So, we have being continuing to meet tp read a story out of the junior bibles they are presented with at their christenings. We chat about any likes, dislikes about the story and what we think its teaching us about God and people. What has worked well in West Hub is that we have a cross-over of christening families attending Starting Rite on different days and venues. Because we can run it at 9:30am Wednesdays at St Matthews Hall, Thursdays at St Pauls Hall, and Fridays at St James Centre there are more opportunities for West Hub Christening families to find a day that suits them. We would always welcome any help at all to run the sessions or even just a friendly face and I'm extremely grateful to the support of those who do help or have helped in the past.

War in Ukraine: Diocese in Europe and USPG

launch Ukraine emergency appeal

The Church of England Diocese in Europe and USPG, the mission agency, have launched an emergency appeal to get aid to people in desperate need because of the invasion of Ukraine.

Funds raised by the appeal will support Christian charities and churches carrying out humanitarian work both in Ukraine and responding to the arrival of refugees in neighbouring countries.

Partners on the ground are providing food, medicine, shelter, care for children and people internally displaced in Ukraine. With refugees they are supplying care at the border and beyond, including attention to those from Africa and Asia as well as Ukrainians who are fleeing the war.

The appeal is for urgent help NOW, but the work will go on for many months.

The Church of England's Bishop in Europe, the Rt Revd Robert Innes says: "War is horrible. It injures, destroys, and kills in an often indiscriminate and uncontrollable way. And now, we face war in Europe.

"The people of our little church, Christ Church Kyiv, find themselves in the midst of this crisis. They are typical of so many others.

"Some have fled the city whilst others are still there; praying for their safety and for peace as they shelter as best they can. These people are our brothers and sisters. Those still in Ukraine and those who have fled need our help."

USPG's General Secretary, the Revd Duncan Dormor, adds: "Our hearts and prayers go out to the people of Ukraine. We have launched this appeal in partnership with the Diocese in Europe to stand in solidarity with the people of Ukraine and support church responses to the current crisis."






